Dr. Schiele recognized MCCN's more than 90 talented faculty and staff; the College's generous scholarship donors; the class of 2012, which includes the first ever MCCN-FMC seniors; the 62 SDAP students who will complete their BSN in just 13 months; the 194 juniors who comprise the largest class; the 151 sophomores who will transition to clinical education this year; and the 157 new freshmen just beginning their journey.

Dr. Schiele pointed out that this academic year of 2011-12 is yet another milestone year for MCCN, with record enrollment, the significant response to the new online RN-BSN Completion Program, and record growth in the graduate program, which now includes 90 students.

Student flag bearers were Patrick Queen, carrying the Mount Carmel College of Nursing flag; senior Stephanie Binkley; junior Lucas Halliday; sophomore Anne Hahn; freshman Florence Smith; and Second Degree Accelerated Program student Will Scott.

Brooke Waddell, SGA president, offered the opening remarks and Student Government leaders were recognized. Chelsi Cummings provided a musical reflection. Prayers and blessings were recited by Shirley Cooley, MSN, RN, Kayla Munk, and Christian Graves.

REQUIRED Criminal **Background Check**

Every sophomore, junior, senior, RN/BSN, and MS student is required to undergo an annual criminal background check. For the convenience of students, on-campus opportunities for fingerprinting are provided on the following dates.

Monday, August 29, noon - 4 p.m. (Student Rec Room, Marian Hall lower level)

Wednesday, August 31, noon – 4 p.m. (Student Rec Room, Marian Hall lower level)

Thursday, September 1, noon – 4 p.m. (Student Rec Room, Marian Hall lower level)

Monday, September 12, noon – 2 p.m. (Student Rec Room, Marian Hall lower level)

Each student must present a valid Ohio driver's license or state-issued ID in order to complete the application form. The \$69 discounted fee for this service by National Background Check (NBC) will be added to the student's FA-11 MCCN account.

Those students unable to be fingerprinted on campus will be responsible for scheduling individual appointments with NBC and completing this requirement

prior to September 2, 2011. The cost incurred for scheduling individually is not discounted and is due the day of fingerprinting (payable directly to NBC).

Any student who fails to complete the required criminal record check by September 12 will risk being dropped from Fall Semester classes.

Special Note to Pre-Licensure Students:

You will be asked at the time you are fingerprinted if you will be graduating at any time from October 2011 through August 2012. A second set of results will be forwarded electronically to the Ohio Board of Nursing and held there until your application to take the NCLEX-RN exam is received by the Board — this is an NCLEX-RN application requirement. This procedure saves you an additional \$69 charge for a second set of results within the same calendar year.

Affiliated Course Schedule

Any student taking a Fall Quarter class at one of our affiliated institutions (Columbus State Community College or The Ohio State University) is required to submit a copy of his/her Fall Quarter course schedule to the MCCN Records and Registration Office (Marian Hall, Room 2C01). The deadline was Friday, August 19.

All students must submit their CSCC or OSU course schedules to MCCN Records and Registration every quarter they take classes. Students who neglect to submit by the August 19 deadline will find that their credit hours at CSCC or OSU will not count toward calculation of total credit hour load for Fall Semester.

Financial aid awards will be based on total registered credit hours as of August 19, 2011. Delinquent students may find themselves at less than full-time hours for financial aid calculation.

IF YOU ARE TAKING AN AFFILIATED COURSE DO NOT IGNORE THE AUGUST 19 DEADLINE!

Freshman Students at Ohio University Lancaster

Any student enrolled as a freshman in the MCCN-FMC program and taking classes at Ohio University Lancaster (OU-L) is required to submit a copy of his/her Fall Quarter course schedule to the MCCN Records and Registration Office (Marian Hall, Room 2C01) no later than Friday, September 9.

All MCCN-FMC students must submit OU-L course schedules to MCCN Records and Registration every quarter they take classes at OU-L.


Application for Graduation

MCCN Awarded \$100,000 in Scholarships for SDAP Students

Instructor Joey Beck, BS, MHA, MSN, RN, Worked on Grant Proposal

Mount Carmel College of Nursing was one of just 52 nursing programs nationwide to receive funding from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF) and the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) through the RWJF New Careers in Nursing Scholarship Program (NCIN). The award was announced in July.

"Please acknowledge **Joey Beck** for all of his work on this grant. We were awarded \$100,000 which will be awarded to ten SDAP students. Congratulations Joey!" said **Ann Schiele, PhD, RN,** President/Dean.

NCIN was launched in 2008 to address the national nursing shortage, develop a demographically representative nursing workforce, and fuel the pipeline of nurse faculty and leaders.



The NCIN program was created through RWJF and AACN to enable schools of nursing to expand student capacity in accelerated baccalaureate and master's programs while building a more diverse workforce ready to serve the needs of a changing patient population. Schools receiving funding through NCIN provide scholarships directly to students from groups underrepresented in nursing or from disadvantaged backgrounds.

Community Service

Social Responsibility is one of the "Core Values" contained in the mission of Mount Carmel College of Nursing. In accordance with the College's Mission and Catholic Identity, the Community Service requirement for nursing students includes the application of one's skills and time to meet identified community needs of vulnerable and at-risk populations.

This activity leads to learning and development through active participation in thoughtfully organized service that:

- is conducted in and meets the needs of the community
- involves reflection and analysis of the experience
- promotes the development of leadership skills, citizen skills, and social responsibility

Pre-licensure students are required to complete 20 clock hours of community service prior to the beginning of the last semester of enrollment (RNs enrolled in the BSN Completion Program and SDAP students must satisfactorily complete 10 clock hours).

Pre-licensure students who do not meet the deadline will be required to complete an additional 10 clock hours (for a total of 30 hours) in order to meet the graduation requirement. RN-BSN and SDAP students who do not meet the deadline will be required to complete an additional 5 clock hours (for a total of 15 hours) in order to meet the graduation requirement

Any student who does not meet the requirement by the policy deadline may participate in Commencement activities but will not receive a diploma or be eligible for NCLEX-RN testing until this requirement is met.

Cristo Rey Columbus Takes Over St. Vincent Family Center Building And Adjacent Parking

MCCN and Mount Carmel West now have a new neighbor adjacent to hospital property — Cristo Rey Columbus, an employer-sponsored school providing a coeducational, Catholic, college-preparatory education for urban youth with limited educational options. The school is located on the corner of South Souder Avenue and West State Street, the former location of St. Vincent Family Center.

While the school is projected to open in 2012, staff is working there now. The parking area immediately west of the school is included as part of the property that the school will use. Mount Carmel Associates and MCCN students and staff should not to park in this area, or their vehicles may be towed.

Some associates have become accustomed to smoking on this property. Because of the nature of this institution, the school will have a no-tolerance policy for smoking on its property.

ATI Comprehensive Review for NCLEX Preparation

Beginning with the 2011-2012 academic year, students graduating from the traditional pre-licensure nursing program are required to attend an ATI Comprehensive Review for NCLEX Preparation. Students on track to graduate from the traditional pre-licensure program are assessed a \$250 senior year fee that enrolls them in the ATI Comprehensive NCLEX Review arranged by the College.

The onsite review is offered in May the week following graduation for May and July graduates. The onsite format consists of a three-day comprehensive in-class review.

October, December, and March graduates are offered an onsite review session if there is a minimum of 25 students in attendance. If there are fewer than 25 students, graduates will enroll in the comprehensive review in a self-paced online format with an individually assigned ATI course instructor. Second Degree Accelerated students will receive information from their Program Coordinators about the ATI review session.

Attention Students: News You Can Use

Co-curricular Activity Summary Questions & Answers

1. What is a Co-curricular Activity Summary (CCAS)?

The CCAS is a program for recording awards, scholarships, community service, educational workshops, leadership activities, student government and organization. By recording activities outside of the classroom, the CCAS is used to complement the academic transcript. Such involvement requires active participation and must be verified by a faculty or administrator of the college.

2. What does it do?

Student involvement in campus activities helps strengthen the student spiritually, emotionally, mentally, physically, socially, culturally, and complements the academic experience. The CCAS is verifiable documentation that details a student's accomplishments and their holistic development throughout their years attending MCCN.

3. Why should I want one?

Through involvement in co-curricular activities and experiences, you gain transferable skills that can be applied to many areas outside of the college setting. As a verifiable college document, the CCAS can be used to support your search for employment after graduation. Creating your CCAS should be an on-going process during your tenure at MCCN. If you begin your CCAS during your first semester, it will provide a more complete record of your involvement and development as a college student.

4. How do I get started?

Each semester, access the Co-curricular Activity Summary Entry and Validation Form from WebCt. Complete one form for each of your out-of-classroom activities and ask the appropriate faculty or staff advisor to verify your active participation by signing the form. Submit the form to the Office of Student Life for documentation.

5. What qualifies as co-curricular activities?

All college approved events and activities. Please do not use abbreviations or acronyms. Those not associated with the college may not be familiar with acronyms like SGA or SNAM.

New Face in Financial Aid

Please join me in welcoming **Theresa Garaux** to the MCCN family. Theresa's first day was August 15, and we are delighted that she has decided to work at the College. Theresa is located in the front area of the Financial Services Suite.

Disbursement of Financial Aid: Financial aid will be applied to your account **after September 1, 2011.** Refund checks will be issued after your tuition balance has been paid. Aid is disbursed in the following manner — grants and scholarships, Direct Stafford loans, private loans and PLUS loans. Please refer to CARMELink to see when your money has been applied to your account. Go to the Business Office tab to review your billing statement.

Scholarships from Convocation: Congratulations to all of the scholarship recipients announced at Convocation. These awards will be added to your financial aid award (available on CARMELink). Most of the scholarships will automatically disburse in the fall and spring semesters.

Ohio College Opportunity Grant: If you are the recipient of the Ohio College Opportunity Grant, the grant will be noted on your financial aid award letter and in the business office. Please check CARMELink.

CARMELink: CARMELink should be your first step in checking for financial aid, billing matters and refunds. Most of your answers can be addressed by logging on to CARMELink.

Private Loans: The arena of financial aid has been impacted by the current lending climate. This means that some of the lenders you used in the past are no longer providing private loans. This also means that it will take two-three weeks to process a private loan. If you apply for a private loan, you will need to follow up with the lenders' requests for you to sign their disclosure statements. Loans are not forwarded to the school for certification until you have signed all of the necessary paperwork.

If you would like to apply for a private loan, please go to mccn.edu, tuition and financial aid, links, FAST ALT Solutions. You will find a list of lenders other students have used. You can also go to the bank or lender of your choice to secure a private loan.

Updating Your FAFSA: Please remember that the FAFSA is an application. Whenever you modify the FAFSA you re-submit your application for federal student aid. Whenever the financial aid office receives a modified FAFSA we are obligated to review it for changes. This sometimes means that the student becomes selected for verification due to a modified FAFSA. If you have received your award letter and you make an adjustment to the FAFSA, and your adjustment is selected for verification, your financial aid will be placed on hold until you complete the verification process. Please be cognizant of the impact of changing your application.

If you have received your award letter, there should be no reason to update your FAFSA.

Formulas for Success: The Essay Assignment

It's the first step of any journey that's the hardest. The adage is certainly true when it comes to writing. Deciding on a topic or direction or format can lead to analysis paralysis, which leads to procrastination . . . and last-minute efforts seldom lead to successful writing projects. Here's the most efficient, effective way to approach any writing project.

- 1) Research first. Take ten minutes to visit MCCN's library though its website. Type your topic in an article search engine (PubMed is my favorite). For example, I typed in "chyroid plexus cyst." The search engine corrected my spelling ("choroid") and found 501 articles for review. I clicked on about 20 abstracts, and printed ten that were interesting.
- 2) Use the rubric. Most professors provide very clear rubrics that include series of questions that must be answered in the paper. Having looked at the research you collected, sit down at the computer and type out the answers to each question. It's not enough to think about the questions, or make notes in a notebook: type out the answers.
- 3) Give it a break. Take at least 24 hours away from your paper. That gives you a little time to refuel. It also gives you a more critical eye when reviewing your work. When I do this as a professional writer, I catch my sentence fragments and phrases that don't make sense it happens to everyone.

Along with editing, write an introduction and conclusion, and create your reference page. Once you've run a grammar check on your computer (or through Grammarly), the paper should be ready to go.


